- **Michigan Tech** – Grooming will be delayed this morning to allow the majority of snow to accumulate. Look for an update later this morning/early afternoon. (2/18/2026)
- **Swedetown** – We are delaying the start of grooming until 8 am once again today, just to let a bit more of this snow fall. Looks like we may actually get a break from all this snow later today! (2/19/2026)
- **Swedetown Snow Bike** - Hello sunshine and clear blue skies! Loops 1-5 got a thorough drag this morning to flatten everything out. Stick and snow bombs are still an issue so watch out still. Also, if you are leaving ruts or divots in the trail, it is too soft and needs to harden. Other than that, enjoy the warm weather!! (2/14/2026)
- **Chassell Ski Trails** - Blades down on the Ginzu to mix in recent snow and set new tracks. (2/7/2026)
- **Chassell Snowshoe Trails** - All 3 loops and the Green Trail have been walked over once with my Iverson's Michigan-style 'woodies' yesterday and today. People have asked me which snowshoe type, the wooden or aluminum, is best. While I will always prefer my quiet woodies that I have used for over 40 years as a forester, the aluminum/traction snowshoes would be the better all-around choice. I consider my 13" x 46" Michigan's as my "floaters" that can carry me into the woods on deep fresh snow easier than the aluminums. As a now retired forester marking trees and running boundary line's, I was always breaking snow the entire day. The Michigan's have about 440 sq. in. footprint. The average aluminum is in the 270-320 sq. in. footprint range. I do have a pair of 28"aluminum's that I would use on crusty snowfields. (2/1/2026)
- **Churning Rapids & Maasto** – All trails will be tracked this morning (2/15/2026)
- **Churning Rapids Snow Bike** - Wow, what a storm! We were able to make an initial pass with just a snowmobile on Wednesday evening to start re-establishing the trail. With more snow on the way Friday, and all three of our main groomers out of town this weekend, the snow bike trails will not be rideable until sometime next week. (2/19/2026)
- **Eagle Harbor Ski Trails** – Everything is packed and tracked and in great shape. Enjoy the day! (2/4/2026)
